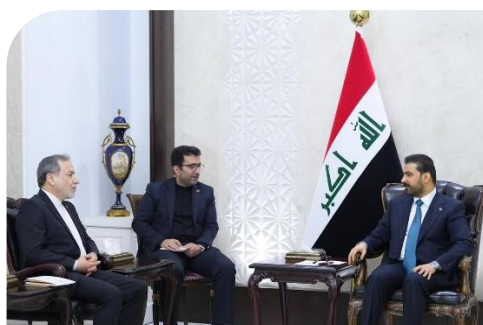

Threats cannot stop Iran's space program, Pars-2 launch preparations underway

Iran's Minister of Information and Communications Technology Sattar Hashemi has praised the continuity of space operations during the recent imposed war despite damage to some infrastructure, saying the resilience demonstrated by experts proved that Iranian space development cannot be halted by attacks on physical facilities.



The minister announced that preparations are underway to place the Pars-2 satellite into orbit, adding that the Shahid Soleimani satellite constellation is expected to be ready for launch by the end of the year.

Hashemi also emphasized technology diplomacy, stronger cooperation with friendly countries and greater participation by the

private sector to enhance the resilience of Iran's space industry.

SCO education ministers censure attacks on Iran's scientific centers



The Shanghai Cooperation Organization Education Ministers have condemned military attacks on Iran's civilian infrastructure, particularly scientific and educational centers, in the final statement of the tenth meeting, held in Minsk, on June 16 and 17.

The SCO member states reviewed the presented reports and documents by Iran, voicing their deep concern over airstrikes on educational, research, and civilian infrastructures.

Referring to the SCO's prior stance, the statement highlighted the unacceptability of the use of force and the need to adhere to the principles of international humanitarian law.

Iranian, Malaysian scientific officials agree on joint engineering projects

Iran's scientific counselor in East Asia, Australia, and New Zealand, Alireza Tavakolpour, and officials from the University of Malaya (UM) have agreed on the implementation of joint engineering projects, including the establishment of twin laboratories and the issuance of double or dual degrees.



The officials met on Sunday to explore avenues for expanding science diplomacy and promoting research collaborations.

The meeting was attended by UM officials, including Mohd Faizul Mohd Sabri, the deputy dean of research and innovation at the faculty of engineering, Nasrul Anuar bin Abd Razak, deputy dean of biomedical engineering, and Nurin Wahidah binti Mohd Zulkifli, head of the Department of Mechanical Engineering.

Evaluating the research capacities of the Faculty of Engineering, UM,

including mechanics, electrical engineering, chemistry, medicine, and civil engineering, the two sides highlighted the need to boost ties in emerging technologies.



Tavakolpour proposed implementing large-scale interdisciplinary research projects, which was welcomed by the Malaysian officials. The two sides also discussed the designation of joint supervising professors, professors, and student exchange.

IRCS proposes UN bodies set up humanitarian training center in West Asia



The head of the Iranian Red Crescent Society (IRCS) has proposed that the United Nations resident coordinator and the director of the Regional Office for West and Central Africa launch a humanitarian training center in West Asia, announcing readiness to take the leading role in this regard.

The IRCS head, Pirhossein Kolivand, offered the proposal in a meeting with the UN resident coordinator, Christine Weigand, and the director of the Regional Office for West and Central Africa at the United Nations Office for the Coordination of Humanitarian Affairs (OCHA), Charles Bernimolin.



Benefiting from 110,000 specialized and trained staff, as well as six million young volunteers, the Iranian Red Crescent Society has a high capacity in providing relief, educational, and humanitarian services, Kolivand said.

Knowledge-based company develops nano kit for early detection of gastric cancer

An Iranian knowledge-based company has managed to develop a nano diagnostic kit for early detection of antigens associated with helicobacter pylori, which is the most frequent cause of chronic gastritis, duodenal ulcer, and stomach cancer.

Helicobacter pylori is a gram-negative bacterium that infects more than half of the world's population. The global prevalence of the infection is estimated to be 44 percent. It is regarded as a significant risk factor for chronic gastric conditions and certain gastrointestinal cancers, yet the infection is preventable if detected early, IRNA reported.

Titled 'Helicobacter Pylori Antigen Rapid Test', the kit is developed based on Lateral Flow Assay technology that enables rapid, easy, low-cost diagnosis of infection in healthcare centers, laboratories, and even at home; the new method is highly accurate and non-invasive.



The achievement will reduce dependence on imported products, enhance the screening system, improve patient access to diagnostic services, and lower healthcare system costs.

CPDI depicts ways to improve Iran's sci-tech co-op with BRICS

The Center for Progress and Development of Iran (CPDI) has prepared a report illustrating Iran's participation in scientific, technological, and innovation cooperation within BRICS, as well as strategic opportunities and required measures to enhance the country's role in this sector.

BRICS, as one of the most important players in the international system in recent years, has made extensive investments in science, technology, and innovation in addition to economic and political cooperation. Now, the bloc has turned into one of the largest scientific cooperation networks in developing countries, benefiting from 14 specialized working groups and dozens of joint research and technological programs.



CPDI, as the center for the coordination of Iran's technological and scientific interactions with BRICS, is responsible for leading the country's representatives, analyzing

special documents, providing technical advice, and developing connections among domestic institutions and BRICS specialized structures.

Tehran, Minsk ink MOU on academic, scientific ties



Hossein Simaei-Sarrafi, the Iranian Minister of Science, Research and Technology, and Denis Korzhitsky, the chairman of the Belarusian State Committee on Science and Technology, signed a memorandum of understanding (MOU) on Thursday to expand educational, research, and technological collaborations.

The MOU was inked at the 8th meeting of the Joint Belarusian-Iranian Commission on Co-operation in Science, Technology and Higher Education, which took place in Minsk.

The commission confirmed the priority areas for 2026-2028 as digital economy and artificial intelligence; innovative industrial

technologies; biological and medical technologies; innovative solutions in the agro-industrial complex and food industry; and development and deepening of the study of the languages and literatures of both countries.

Iran proposes BRICS+ develop reliable computing power networks

Iran's representative at the BRICS Future Network Innovation Forum 2026, held in Shenzhen from June 16 to 17, proposed the establishment of a cooperation framework for the BRICS Plus partnership to develop future digital infrastructure, strengthen industrial cooperation, and promote cross-border interactions among member states.

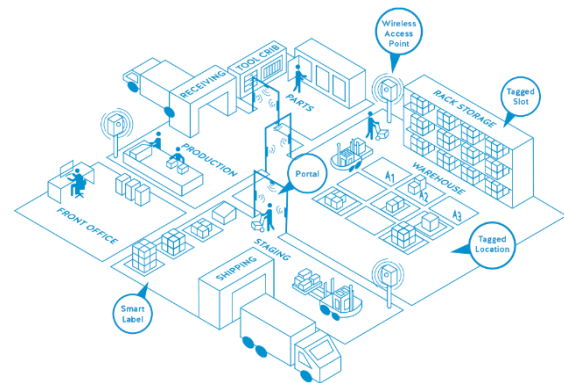


Delivering a speech, titled 'From connectivity to reliable computing power networks; enabling shared digital growth, industrial cooperation, and transboundary interactions', Mohammad-Hossein

Sheikhi, an official with the Ministry of Information and Communications Technology (ICT), outlined Iran's views and proposals in developing future digital infrastructure.



“Connectivity, network coverage, and bandwidth are essential for digital development, but meeting emerging needs requires an approach that goes beyond traditional network development,” the official said.



The expansion of technologies such as artificial intelligence (AI), industrial Internet of Things (IoT), smart logistics, smart energy systems, modern financial technologies, and digital platforms requires integrated, smart, and reliable infrastructures, he stressed.

Iran leads regional countries in Scopus-indexed journals 2026

With 464 journals indexed by the Scopus database from 2011 to 2026, Iran ranks first among regional countries. Turkey, with 344 Scopus-indexed journals, is placed second, IRNA reported.

The number of Iranian journals has experienced a sustained upward trend, increasing from 95 journals in 2011 to 464 journals in 2026, the report added.



The strategic priority of the country's research system in 2026 focuses on not just increasing the number of journals, but also improving the quality of works, which requires enhancing standards in evaluation processes, recruiting international reviewers and authors, and adhering to publication ethics to elevate Iran's scientific standing on a global scale.

Iranian scholar receives MAB Young Scientist Award



The Department of Environment (DOE) and the National Commission for the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization's (UNESCO) have honored the Iranian scholar Behzad Qiasi by presenting him with the UNESCO Man and the Biosphere (MAB) Young Scientists Award 2025 for his project 'Develop a sustainable hydrotourism model in Iran's Miankaleh Biosphere Reserve'.



Qiasi is a faculty member of the University of Tehran and holds a Ph.D. in Water Resources and Environmental Engineering.

His project aims to restore wetlands while supporting local livelihoods. He will work with communities, NGOs, and government agencies to design eco-friendly tourism that reduces pressure on water resources.



Through environmental and economic assessments, he will identify viable green jobs linked to cultural heritage and nature conservation. His project will empower local voices, especially youth and women, and produce a replicable model for other fragile wetland reserves.

In 2025, 11 young researchers from across the globe, including Morocco, China, Congo, the U.S., Brazil, Ghana, and Algeria, received MAB Young Scientists Awards for their outstanding efforts and contributions.

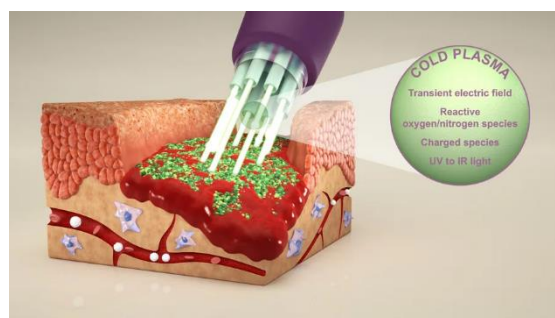
17th cold plasma clinic for wound healing inaugurated

The seventeenth cold plasma clinic in the country was inaugurated on Monday in the city of Rafsanjan,

southeastern Kerman province, providing promising treatment for chronic wounds, diabetic ulcers, burns, and skin lesions under health insurance coverage.



Known as one of the world's most innovative treatment methods, the non-thermal plasma therapy is highly effective in wound healing compared to traditional methods and ozone therapy. The treatment is performed on an outpatient basis, painlessly, without the need for anaesthesia.



Cold atmospheric plasma has been shown to reduce microbial load without any known significant negative effects on healthy tissues. This issue should enhance its possible application to any microbial infection site. It has also been shown to have anti-tumour effects.

Iranian girls grab medals at OpenGeo 2026

Four Iranian female students attended the Open International Geography Olympiad (OpenGeo) 2026, winning four medals, including a silver medal and three bronze medals for the first time.

Artina Heidari won the silver medal; Setayesh Haqnazari, Sana Karbalaeei Vali, and Helia Khodabandelou received the bronze medals.

The achievement showcased the Iranian students' comprehensive expertise in geography and serves as a significant step in preparing students for successful participation in the International Geography Olympiad (IGO).

The OpenGeo aims to promote interest in geography among secondary school students worldwide; develop geographical

thinking, analytical, and practical skills among school students and future geographers; and support international connections between young geographers.

Organized by the Faculty of Geography, Lomonosov Moscow State University, Moscow State University High School, and Primakov School, the competition was held online on June 20 and 21, with competitors from 27 countries attending the contest.

The participants were students aged between 14 and 19 years old enrolled in secondary school or graduating in 2026.

The competition consisted of a Written Response Test (WRT) taking 2.5 hours, a Practical and Mapping Exercise (PME) taking 2.5 hours, and a Multimedia Test (MMT) taking one hour.

Iran's International Renewable Energy Conference, Exhibit to be held on July 20-21

The 10th International Iran Renewable Energy Conference and Exhibition (IRAN REC 2026) will be held concurrently with the 7th edition of the National Renewable Energy Award on July 20 and 21 at the Milad Tower International Conference Center.



According to a report from the Vice Presidency for Science, Technology and Knowledge-Based Economy, given the transition of renewable energy from an "alternative option" to one of the "main pillars of the country's energy planning", this event is designed to create a specialized platform for interaction among industries, investors, knowledge-based companies, and the academic community.

The rapid development of solar power plants, the successful formation of the green electricity market, and the legal requirements for supplying industries' electricity from clean sources indicate that this industry has entered a stage of growth and maturity, which will be specifically examined at this event.

Iran, South Africa emphasize development of cooperation in energy sector

Iran's Minister of Oil held talks with the Minister of Electricity and Energy of South Africa regarding the development of bilateral cooperation in the energy sector.



Mohsen Paknejad, on the sidelines of the 11th Meeting of BRICS Energy Ministers, on June 25, on the second day of his visit to India, met with

Kgosientsho Ramokgopa, the Minister of Electricity and Energy of South Africa, and emphasized the development of bilateral cooperation.

Tehran, Muscat decide to form a joint committee to implement provisions of customs agreement

The heads of customs of Iran and Oman, on the sidelines of the World Customs Organization summit, emphasized the operationalization of the provisions of the agreement on mutual administrative assistance in customs matters and proposed the formation of a joint committee regarding the implementation of the agreement's provisions.



Foroud Asgari, Deputy Minister of Economy and head of the Islamic Republic of Iran Customs Administration, and Said bin Khamis al-Ghaithi, head of the Royal Customs of Oman, in a bilateral meeting, emphasized increasing and expanding customs cooperation in line with the provisions of the signed agreement in customs fields.

The proposal to conduct study visits to customs offices and ports of destination and origin, as well as holding periodic meetings between the customs administrations of the two countries, were among the topics reviewed in this meeting.

Iran-China reach preliminary agreement to sign railway customs cooperation document



The heads of customs of Iran and China agreed to sign a railway customs cooperation document with the aim of facilitating and increasing trade exchanges between the two countries.

According to IRNA from the Customs Administration of the Islamic Republic of Iran, the heads of customs of Iran and China, in a bilateral meeting on the sidelines of the World Customs Organization (WCO) summit, reviewed the grounds for increasing cooperation between the two customs administrations to develop trade exchanges.

In this meeting, Foroud Asgari, Deputy Minister of Economy and head of the Islamic Republic of Iran Customs Administration, and Zhang Baofeng, Deputy Minister and head of the General Administration of Customs of the People's Republic of China, discussed the signing of a railway customs cooperation document to effectively utilize railway capacities between the two countries with the aim of increasing trade exchanges.

Iran, Kurdistan region agree to organize trade at Kermanshah border



In a joint meeting between officials of Iran and the Kurdistan Region of

Iraq at the Sheikh Saleh border in Salas-e Babajani county, Kermanshah province, solutions for organizing border exchanges, facilitating the entry of goods, and examining the possibility of expanding agricultural product exports were discussed.



This meeting was held with the presence of the Governor of Salas-e Babajani county, the Special Assistant to the Governor of Kermanshah for Iraqi Affairs, the Head of the Sheikh Saleh Border Customs, and the official in charge of customs for the Kurdistan Region of Iraq, during which solutions for developing economic cooperation and removing obstacles to border trade were examined.

Iran emerges as critical transit link between Iraq, Afghanistan, South Asia

Recent developments in Iran's transport and logistics sector have underscored the country's growing importance as a regional transit hub

connecting the West Asia with Central and South Asia.

Two major announcements, the successful completion of the first liquefied petroleum gas (LPG) export operation from Khorramshahr Port to Afghanistan and Pakistan via multimodal transport, and the launch of the first combined rail transit shipment from Iraq to Afghanistan through western Iran, demonstrate Tehran's strategic efforts to capitalize on its geographic position and strengthen its role in regional trade.



The first development came from Khorramshahr Port, where authorities announced the successful completion of the first LPG export operation using combined transport methods to Afghanistan and Pakistan. Located near the head of the Persian Gulf, Khorramshahr serves as one of Iran's key maritime gateways. The new operation combines maritime, rail, and land transportation networks to move energy products more efficiently to regional markets.

Iran presents investment-ready projects to Azerbaijan

According to the Renewable Energy Organization and Electricity Energy Efficiency Organization (SATBA), Hamidreza Azimi at the 6th Meeting of Energy Ministers of the Shanghai Cooperation Organization in Bishkek, Kyrgyzstan, added: Based on the statement read by the Deputy

Minister of Electricity and Energy of the Ministry of Power, following constructive consultations between the Islamic Republic of Iran and the Secretariat of the Shanghai Cooperation Organization, the plan "Initiative for Convergence and Electricity Connection of Member States" was proposed by Iran, which was welcomed by the countries present at this meeting.

The Deputy Head of the Renewable Energy Organization and Electricity Energy Efficiency Organization stated: In this regard, the Ministry of Power of the Islamic Republic of Iran has presented a concept note for this initiative, in which the exchange of policy experiences in demand management, energy market regulation, and infrastructure development are also among the other important axes of cooperation.

What Does Nazri Mean in Religious Beliefs?

The overwhelming, savory smell of food is wafting out gently while you could hear mourners reciting elegies from far off, the bell is ringing, you open the door and voila dear neighbor brought you some Nazri.



Nazri is a general term used for literally everything that is given away freely by one person or a group of people, most often on religious occasions and for religious reasons.

Nazri is a votive offering, some decide to give away the free stuff to the less fortunate, for example, they offer clothes to poor people who cannot afford to buy new clothes, most of the time on condition of animosity to avoid hurting their self-esteem. Some others decide to do volunteer works at hospitals or homes for the less fortunate.

But one of the most popular types of Nazri is distributing different types of food stuff, drinks, fruits, etc. among the public.



This could happen at any time of the year and the food stuff can be distributed solely among the disadvantaged or anyone regardless of their social and economic situation.

The mourning holy month of Muharram is known famously as the time when people distribute Nazri, however, there are other religious occasions, including the birth and martyrdom anniversary of Shia Imams, when people also distribute free food to commemorate the occasions.



Nonetheless, the month of Muharram, the first month of the Islamic calendar, when the third Shia Imam and his most loyal followers were martyred by their contemporary dictator, and illegitimate ruler Yazid in 680 AD Battle of Karbala, marks one of the most significant religious occasions when people choose to make the offering.

The food is usually cooked in very big copper pots in great quantities. People usually do not get paid for cooking or preparing Nazri food stuff or drinks because they would also like to have a part in its preparation for its merit.



Therefore, one does not have to be necessarily too rich to pay for the whole thing, some chip in and only pay a small amount of the money needed for preparing Nazri. Others do volunteer works for preparation and distribution of the food for its spiritual award. Usually after taking part in mourning ceremonies either in mosques or other congregational halls, the mourners are offered the free food stuff.

However, those in charge of distributing Nazri food may show up at neighbors' houses and offer them the food.

Khoresh Gheymeh, beef and yellow split pea stew usually served with pan fried potatoes and rice, is one of the most popular Nazri dishes distributed among mourners on the occasion of Muharram.



Another popular Nazri food is Khoresh Ghomeh-Sabzi. It is also a stew made with fresh herbs, kidney beans and beef. It is served with rice as well.

Adas-polo, rice and lentil served alternatively with pan fried ground meat, fried onions and/or fried raisins, is another dish served as Nazri.

Various drinks are also served.

Due to the adherence to the lunar calendar, Muharram can fall on different seasons throughout the years.



During hot seasons people usually distribute cold drinks like fruit juice or homemade syrups among mourners. In cold seasons warm drinks like tea and hot milk are served.

Nazri food is considered a blessed food and many people believe that eating it, even just a bite, will bring them good fortune.



Imam Hussein (AS) and his loyal family members and companions fought bravely for justice and freedom. He was a champion of the oppressed.

Any forms of Nazri, be it food, volunteer service, etc. is a way of expressing solidarity with Imam Hussein (AS) and his grand ambitions for a better world where oppressors are doomed to fail.



Ash Sholeh Ghalamkar

Ash Sholeh Ghalamkar is one of the most famous Persian traditional broths. The way to make it requires a lot of patience and takes up a variety of beans, herbs, and meat.

Ash Sholeh Ghalamkar is a very hard and time-consuming broth, but the result is worth the patience and the difficulty. It is also delicious and nourishing, and it is highly recommended to consume.

This broth is full of protein so it's highly recommended to anemic people and children who are at growth age.

Ash Sholeh Ghalamkar might be similar to ash reshteh in appearance, but the tastes are totally different.

Ingredients

½ cup peas

¼ cup white beans

¼ cup beans

⅓ cup cowpea

½ cup lentils

½ cup mung bean

1 cup rice

½ cup wheat

0.5 Kg mutton

½ cup vegetables for Ash (including, parsley, coriander, scallion, spinach. Note that for Ash Sholeh Ghalamkar you also need savory and tarragon.



piaz dagh, fried mints, Salt, pepper, cinnamon and cumin as much as required.

Instructions

1. the peas, the white beans, the cheetah beans and the wheat need to be soaked and left in some water from the night (at least 12 hours) before you want to cook this dish, and change the water with some fresh water several times.
2. Soak the other legumes, such as the raw beans, the lentils, the mung beans, and the rice, in the morning (6 hours) of the day you want to cook the broth.
3. Make a lot of fried onion and leave it aside.
4. Place the meat with one onion and 2 to 3 sticks of cinnamon, salt, and pepper in a pot on the heat so that they cook well and become softer.
5. Cook all the beans, rice and wheat in three different pots. It's not possible to cook them in the same dishes, because each one has a different process of cooking. The beans need at least 3 hours, rice needs at least 1 hour and the wheat needs at least 1 hour of being heated. Based on the mentioned times given, cook them separately in different pans and manage your time.
6. Place the cooked beans on the heat with meat juice (Meat Stock can be used as well).
7. Beat and mix the cooked wheat and the cooked rice.
8. Also beat the meat into a bowl.



9. It will make your broth sticky. When the beans have come to boil, remove more than half of them from the water and knock them back and bring them back into the pot.

10. Add the chopped rice and the wheat to the contents of the pot and place the fried onion in it and stir it.

Piazza: Iran's players have improved, but I'm still not satisfied

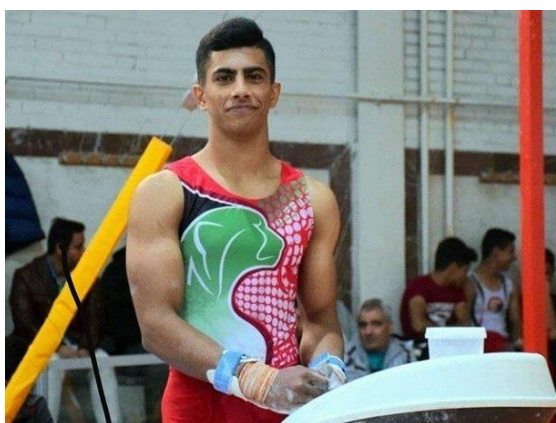
Saudi Arabia 4-0 in the Male Kumite +84kg final.

leader's residence and office as national heritage sites because of their historical significance.

Isfahan unveils tourism roadmap, plans heritage restoration after recent damage

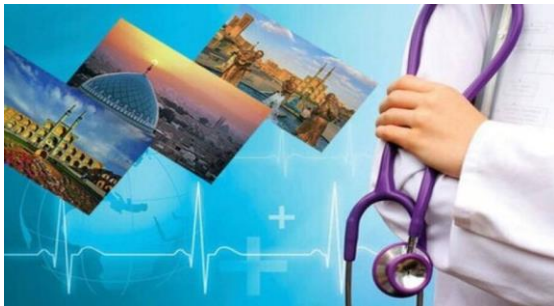

Speaking at the 37th meeting of the Strategic Council of Iran's Ministry of Cultural Heritage, Tourism and Handicrafts in Isfahan, attended by Minister of Cultural Heritage, Tourism and Handicrafts Seyyed Reza Salehi-Amiri, senior ministry officials and provincial heritage managers, Jamalinejad outlined the province's heritage assets, challenges and development priorities.

He said Isfahan is not only one of Iran's industrial, agricultural and economic hubs but also one of the country's principal cultural and historical regions, playing a significant role in the development of Iranian-Islamic civilization over centuries.

Iran seeks larger share of Muslim health tourism market



Iran should shift its medical tourism strategy from relying primarily on attracting foreign patients to exporting healthcare services, developing joint investments abroad and expanding regional partnerships, the head of the Iran Chamber of Commerce's tourism commission said during a meeting with industry representatives in the southern province of Fars.

Seyyed Mostafa Mousavi said Iran needed to move beyond the traditional model of bringing patients into the country and instead focus on exporting healthcare services, establishing joint medical facilities in neighboring countries and

strengthening the value chain of its healthcare sector.

Mousavi said recent regional developments showed that companies focused on neighboring markets had demonstrated greater resilience during periods of crisis, adding that Iraq, Afghanistan, Azerbaijan and Pakistan should become priorities under Iran's new health tourism strategy.

French archaeologist cracks 4,000-year-old Elamite script from Iran



French archaeologist François Desset has decoded the 4,000-year-old Linear Elamite writing system from ancient Iran, unlocking one of the last undeciphered scripts of the ancient Near East after years of research.

Iran minister announces memorial initiatives for Minab school attack victims



Iran's Minister of Cultural Heritage, Tourism and Handicrafts, Seyyed Reza Salehi-Amiri, said that the government plans to establish a national campaign to commemorate those martyred in the missile strike on Shajareh Tayyebbeh Elementary School in Minab, including the creation of a museum, a permanent secretariat and a nationwide cultural initiative.

Salehi-Amiri said commemorating the victims of the Minab school attack was "a moral, human and national responsibility."

The strike took place on Feb. 28, the first day of the US-Israeli war with Iran, when school's roof collapsed, killing 156 civilians, including 120 schoolchildren. The victims also included 26 female teachers, one of whom was six months pregnant, seven parents, a school bus driver and a technician at a nearby clinic.

Official highlights Tirgan as key element of Iran's intangible cultural heritage

The head of Iran's Research Institute of Cultural Heritage and Tourism has described the ancient festival of Tirgan as one of the country's most significant elements of intangible cultural heritage, saying it reflects enduring links between nature, mythology and Iranian society.



Zarei said Tirgan represents values including hope, prayers for rainfall, social solidarity and respect for water as the source of life.

"Tirgan is one of the brightest manifestations of Iran's cultural calendar," Zarei said. "It is a deeply rooted celebration that has remained alive and dynamic in the country's cultural memory through the centuries."

Celebrated on the 13th day of the Iranian month of Tir, which usually falls on July 2 or 3 in the Gregorian calendar, Tirgan is traditionally associated with water, rainfall and the protection of natural resources.

Archaeologists say excavations at Kalgeh Zarrin could deepen understanding of Elymaean kingdom

Archaeologists leading excavations at the ancient site of Kalgeh Zarrin near the southwestern Iranian city of Masjed Soleyman said continued scientific research, stronger protection measures and investment in cultural tourism could help reveal new information about the ancient Elymaean kingdom while contributing to local economic development.



The excavation directors said the archaeological site, which dates to the 2nd century B.C. and is listed as one of Iran's national heritage sites, occupies a strategic position for studying the political, economic, social and religious structures of the Elymaean state, which ruled parts of southwestern Iran during the Parthian period.

Research and creativity essential to preserving traditional pottery painting: ceramic artist



An Iranian ceramic painter said the long-term survival of traditional pottery painting depends on sustained research, creativity and continuous training, adding that artistic commitment rather than commercial considerations has been the driving force behind her work for more than two decades.

Mahboubeh Kamalinejad, a designer and ceramic painter, said she has worked in pottery painting since 2003 and that many artists in the field began their careers through personal interest and a commitment to preserving traditional art.

Genetic tests underway on remains found in Ilkhanid royal cemetery

Iranian archaeologists have begun genetic analysis of human remains uncovered in newly excavated Ilkhanid-era royal tombs near the UNESCO-listed Dome of Soltaniyeh

in northwestern Iran, as researchers seek to identify members of the ruling dynasty buried at the site.



The latest archaeological season at the historic Soltaniyeh complex in Zanjan province uncovered two burial chambers within the Ilkhanid royal cemetery adjacent to the Mausoleum of Oljaytu, one of Iran's most significant medieval monuments.

According to Hamed Zeyfar, deputy director of the archaeological excavations at the Soltaniyeh royal tombs, the newly discovered chambers contained numerous human remains that preliminary evidence suggests belonged to members of a single royal family.

Digital intl. driving license launched with online verification

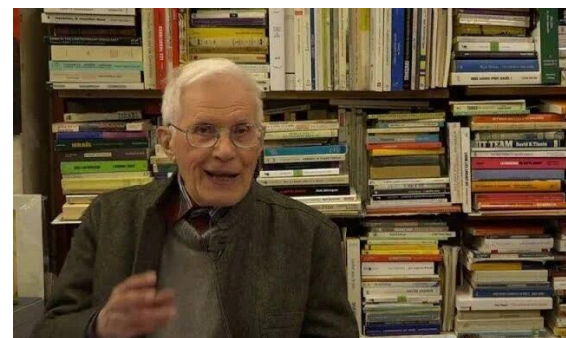
Iran has introduced a digital version of its international driving license that allows applicants to access the document alongside the physical copy and verify its authenticity online.

French Iranologist Charles-Henri De Fouchécour dies at 100

Charles-Henri de Fouchécour, a French Iranologist, scholar of Persian literature and translator of the Divan of Hafez into French, died on June 19 at the age of 100.



De Fouchécour was widely recognized for his contribution to Persian literary studies in Europe through his academic work, translations and research spanning several decades.

Iran plans heritage education program in schools

Iran's Ministry of Cultural Heritage, Tourism and Handicrafts is planning to introduce a nationwide "Heritage and Museum Bell" program in schools as part of efforts to strengthen students' awareness of the country's cultural heritage.

The proposal was discussed during a meeting between officials from the Ministry of Cultural Heritage and the Ministry of Education.

Ali Saeidi, an official with the cultural heritage ministry, said the two ministries were working toward signing a comprehensive cooperation agreement to expand heritage-related

educational programs across the country.



"Our main and strategic decision is to conclude a comprehensive memorandum of understanding between the Ministry of Education and the Ministry of Cultural Heritage," Saeidi said, adding that a joint working group would be needed to prepare the agreement.

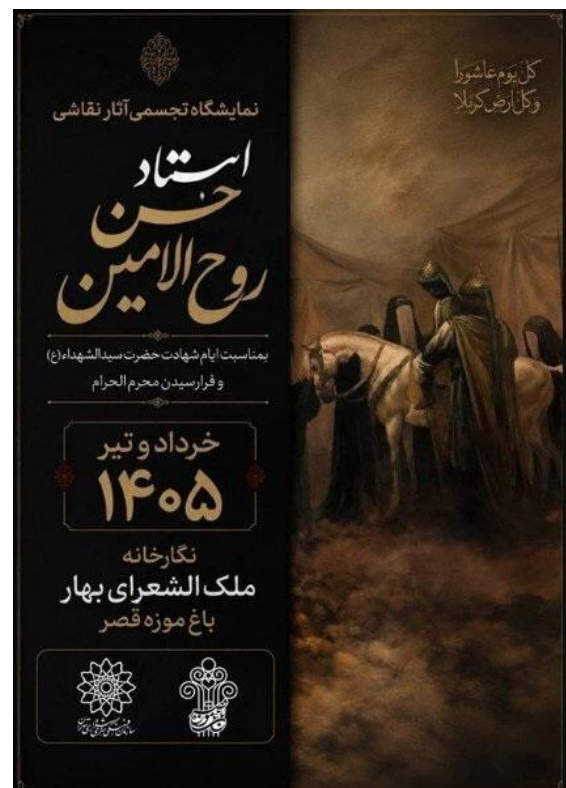
